Plastic Free July

At St Luke's we're committed to caring for our environment, in alignment with the Fifth Mark of Mission of the World Wide Anglican Communion: To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth. One of the strengths of our church community is our commitment to make use and reuse of the resources at hand. The op shop is a great example of



recycling clothes and household goods. Rather than sending them to landfill when they are no longer wanted, clothes and other items are sold for a very cheap price to support and outreach into our local community. The community garden will be another practical way of responding to this important Mark of Mission. We also use rain water tanks, solar panels and energy efficient lighting.

Are you up for the challenge of a plastic free July?

When you are at church, please remember to properly recycle paper and cardboard and use the green organics kitchen bin for food scraps. Why not take soft plastics (like Glad wrap or plastic bags) home and pop them in the plastic recycle drop offs at Coles and Woolworths? Better still, look for opportunities to not even use plastic wraps and bags. There are a number of places where you can buy reusable items like these: string or cotton shopping bags, bamboo toothbrushes, steel straws and cleaners, reusable produce bags, beeswax food wrap, reusable coffee cups... the list goes on. You can buy these products at health shops, some supermarkets or specialty stores, or there are some excellent online sites that I have used: Onya and Biome. Recently Aldi were selling reusable fresh produce bags, making it easier and more accessible for everyone to get into the spirit of making a plastic free July a plastic free planet.

We only have one Earth - let's do our bit to preserve it!

David and I recently were lucky enough to enjoy a European River cruise from Amsterdam to Budapest, travelling through The Netherlands, Germany, Austria, Slovakia, and Hungary, sailing on the Rhine, and Main (pronounced Mine) Rivers, the Main Danube Canal and the Danube



River. It was a great way to visit some of towns and small villages in this part of Europe. There were arranged walking tours in Cologne, Oberwesel, Mittenberg, Wertheim, Wurzburg, Bamberg, Nürnberg, Regensburg, Passau, Dürnstein, Vienna, Bratislava, and Budapest. Most of these were with guides and usually with some free time to explore yourself. In most towns there was one or two cathedrals to visit and quite a few palaces.

I think at times we thought 'not another cathedral' and then inside we would stand awed at paintings, statutes, chapels and history etc. In Vienna we attended a "Sound of Vienna" concert. These are on every night for the pleasure of all the tourists travelling there.



On the ship we treated to a cooking demonstration of how to make Apple Strudel in Vienna,

a Bavarian Folklore Show, and a Bavarian lunch – whole pig, pretzels, various Bavarian sausages, potato salad etc in Regensburg, and a Hungarian Folklore show in Budapest then a night cruise on the Danube to see the lights – spectacular. After a day in Budapest we then joined some of our fellow travellers on a bus tour to Croatia and along the Dalmatian coast to Venice where we spent another couple of days before flying back to Adelaide. We arrived home ready to have a rest as we had certainly seen so much of Europe in such a short time there was not much time to rest.

It was moving for all of us to discover how many children suffer from deprivation and abuse but likewise to know that the development of this project by the Interdenominational churches was providing hope for children in need initially guided by Bishop Tutu.

This project has grown and it was a delight for me to see that the children have also grown and are safe and happy. There are two homes now, [each housing six children] both supported by us and Simon's town parish.

St Luke's, has during this time, via members of our congregation provided financial support to ensure the children flourish emotionally, physically and educationally. Currently 24 members of the parish assist in this vital mission
